




Fig. 1 - Typical Forward Voltage Drop Characteristics




Fig. 2 - Typical Values of Reverse Current vs. Reverse Voltage



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


Fig. 3 - Typical Junction Capacitance vs. Reverse Voltage




Fig. 4 - Maximum Allowable Case Temperature vs. Average Forward Current




Fig. 5 - Forward Power Loss Characteristics




Fig. 6 - Typical Reverse Recovery Time vs. dl<sub>F</sub>/dt





Fig. 7 - Typical Stored Charge vs. dl<sub>F</sub>/dt




